THE FUTURE OF THE PROJECT

Strategic planning and future proofing have been at the fore for Ruahine Kiwi as the project nears the end of funding linked to the Department of Conservation 'Jobs for Nature' initiative.

There is a firm understanding that this is a forever project, not something that neatly fits a three-year funding timespan. Though on track to release kiwi in 2026, there is much mahi necessary to keep current traps monitored and get the area kiwi ready beyond mid-2024.

The work undertaken to control predator pests has a huge effect on other species of flora and fauna resulting in a rich, vibrant ecosystem supporting a plethora of life. It's exciting, impactful, necessary work that we do in collaboration with other incredible predator control projects in the region working with other species such as whio.

Our challenge is securing and maintaining sufficient funding to ensure that we can deliver these outcomes.
