Environment Network Manawatū is looking for a Manawatū Food Rescue Declaration Project Lead. The role will be focused on supporting and advocating for food industry organisations and community groups in the Manawatū River catchment to commit to a significant reduction in avoidable food waste. The Manawatū Food Rescue Declaration

Project's goal is to create a platform to divert all edible, but unsalable food to the community, thus reducing food waste and increasing food resilience. The project will have a significant impact on people's ability to access healthy nourishing food and the overall wellbeing of people residing in the Manawatū River catchment.
