Launch of the Southern Ruahine Kiwi Habitat Restoration Project

The official launch of the project was attended by around 60 people at the Pohangina DoC base 35 minutes from Ashhurst nestled at the base of the Ruahines. The project is led by ENM on behalf of Manawatū River Source to Sea and Te Kāuru Eastern Manawatū River Hapū Collective. The launch was an opportunity to talk to involved parties about the project and what it is, celebrate its beginnings and look forward to a future where kiwi are able to be reintroduced to the area by 2026. <u>Closing 15th of March.</u> The ENM Environmental Initiatives Fund Large Grants Round.

The fund supports Palmerston North-based community initiatives that improve environmental outcomes. Small Grants (up to \$1000) and Large Grants (between \$1000 and \$12,000) are available for projects that align with PNCC's Eco-City Strategy priorities, and any identified priorities of the network. These funds have been made available through a Palmerston North City Council Strategic Priorities Grant.

The Large Grants round closes 15th March 2022.
