Small Grants (up to \$1000) and Large Grants (between \$1000 and \$12,000) are available for projects that align with PNCC's Eco-City Strategy priorities, and any identified priorities of the Environment Network Manawatū. This funding has been made possible by Palmerston North City Council.

6.. Kuaha Matihiko: Digital Gateway project. A collaborative team across AgResearch, Massey University and Waka Digital have been successful in obtaining funding from the Our Land and Water National Science Challenge to develop a new gateway to give all New Zealanders transparent access to trusted data sources. Land and water data can be inaccessible, expensive, hard to find, or not publicly available. The Kuaha Matihiko: Digital Gateway project aims to create a digital gateway to data and tools that is user-friendly, open-access, inclusive, collaborative, and trustworthy.

An important part of the project is to undertake a data-use stocktake. Here the intention is to reach out to users and creators of data across scales (e.g. community groups, mana whenua, regional councils, agribusiness, central government) to undertake a very short 4 min survey through our website – <u>www.finddata.co.nz</u> – which provides some context for their organisation, data activities and key datasets for land and water that stakeholders create, provide, use or manage. This information will be used to identify the data resources which are most utilised by different stakeholder groups and allow us to ensure that this information is readily accessible to all users through the gateway. This information will be anonymous and a summary of responses will be made available on the website once responses have been collated. This information will be important to prioritise which of the many, many land and water datasets are linked through to the gateway.

#### The Recreational Path Fund Application.

The Te Ahu a Turanga: Manawatū Tararua Highway Project includes a Shared Use Path that runs the length of the new road and provides a new pedestrian and cycle connection between Ashhurst (Cambridge Avenue) and Woodville (Hampson Street).Waka Kotahi has made funding available through the Recreational Paths Fund for community groups or organisations that want to complement the path by adding other trails that provide access for recreational users. The fund will be available until March 2025, if not awarded prior.
