## WHATS HAPPENING

### Friday For Our Future



Extinction Rebellion (XR) is a global movement that wants to challenge the system that causes and allows climate change to accelerate. As part of that the Manawatu group stands in the Square on the first Friday of each month reminding people that we have a life threatening emergency.

Wyatt and Rennie had never participated in a protest before, but they decided to join Friday For Our Future (F4F), an event organised by Extinction Rebellion Manawatū. The name comes from Greta Thunberg, the Swedish school girl who skipped school on Fridays to stand out outside Parliament on Fridays because what's the point of going to school if you have no future? At first, stepping out of their comfort zones felt a little daunting-standing in the rain, waving flags, and speaking up for a cause bigger than themselves. The group was filled with passionate, like-minded individuals, all united in the fight against climate change. Wyatt and Rennie found themselves laughing and chatting with fellow protesters, feeling a strong sense of camaraderie while cars honked in support, some drivers even giving a thumbs-up, which made the whole experience feel like a celebration of collective action They had the opportunity to chat with nearly everyone in the group and received some kind feedback about ENM and the work we've been doing. ### Foxton Estuary Water Quality

The health of our estuary, and all that lives in or around it, depends hugely on the quality of water flowing down the Manawatu River. There is a public perception that the quality is not great, but what are the facts? Horizons Regional Council has teams that do a lot of good work on river water quality and its sources. Their work includes monitoring and publishing scientific, technical data.

Manawatū Estuary Trust Water Quality Group has been liaising with Horizons experts to provide simple information to our community about water quality, such as: What is the measure of good quality? What is the quality now? How has it changed over time? What is being done to improve it? Can I swim? Can I fish?

Their aim is to make this information easily available in a simple, understandable form. Watch this space for progress!

At our last event, a man brought in a weed eater that needed its head fixed. He had the replacement parts and his toolbox, but what he really needed was some guidance on how to do the job. This is exactly what the Repair Café is all about—empowering people to fix their own things. We showed him the ropes, walking him through each step of the repair. With a bit of teamwork, a few adjustments, and some problem-solving, the weed eater was soon back in action.

In the end, it was a fantastic outcome. He walked away with a working weed eater and a fresh set of skills.

### Stream Clean Up Results



February kicked off our stream clean-up programme once again. Off the back of these events, we were able to finalise the revised event organisers' guide, thanks to some valuable feedback.

Tanenuiarangi Manawatū Charitable Trust hosted a successful clean-up along Flygers Line, clearing 1.7km of drain and removing a massive **1,400kg of rubbish.** A team of 42 volunteers from TMCT, Fulton Hogan, Moana NZ, and ENM rolled up their sleeves and got stuck in.

Moana NZ staff also ran their own clean-up of the Mangaone Stream, clearing 481 metres and collecting **122.5kg** of waste—an awesome effort from their crew alone.
